PRESIDENT'S REPORT

When I was 11 my uncle introduced me to the world of golf. While one was supposed to be 12 in order to caddy at Griffith Park Golf Course in Los Angeles, my uncle worked at the course and "got me in." He lured me away from my job as a newspaper boy, hawking the TIMES and EXAMINER papers in front of Gate 6 at Lockheed Aircraft in Burbank at 5 AM. I was earning a guaranteed \$1 a day, but the thought of getting to sleep a bit later and being outdoors won the day. One could earn between \$3 and \$5 depending on if you could read greens as well as the generosity of the player, and you could get in two loops (rounds) a day. At first my impression of golf was that it was a game for old men and ladies ... that is until I tried to play. Between loops, I would use borrowed clubs and try to chip and putt. In those days you had to have your own shag bag – which was no problem because another "between loops" activity was looking for lost balls.

That was my introduction to a life-long love/hate affair with golf. My uncle made me caddy for him FOR FREE so he could teach me the nuances of caddying. I learned how to cradle the bag across my bag and use my arm to take the weight of the bag off my shoulders. At 11, I was probably 4'6" and most bags weighed more than I did. Caddying double was a stretch. My uncle taught me how to rake traps properly, replace divots, fix ball marks on

the greens as well as the headier stuff such as clubbing my player and reading greens. Caddying also taught me a lot about character – those who had it and those who did not. At 11 I was a bit naive and cheating wasn't really a part of my world, nor was gamesmanship or needling – the art of throwing someone off his game with a well placed jab. I learned that there were people you trusted and people you stayed with in the woods just to make sure they didn't have another miraculous "find."

But what I learned the most is that I really loved the game of golf. I loved the personal challenge of improving. I still remember the first time I broke 100; then 90, and, then 80. Most of us remember that first birdie or eagle; fewer of us remember that first hole-in-one. Exhilaration was unmatched. I was fortunate enough to play in a junior program and, then, move on to high school and college golf and, as a result got to meet a lot of fantastic people. I also got to meet a lot of people whom I knew I did not want to be like. I got to meet and play with people who are still friends today and friends with whom I still get to stroll a fairway and, together, remember just how lucky we are to play this game.

I didn't just take away memories; I took away a respect for a game that challenges you mentally, emotionally and physically. I trust that is true for many of you which brings me to a point. Whether you are a long-time golfer or a newbie, respect for the game produces some actions that I hope we are cultivating in our club. Respect for the course, that sees one repairing his ball marks on the green – first, because you made the mark and second, out of respect for your playing partners and other golfers. You don't want yourself or them to pay the price for a putt ruined by a ball mark. I am hoping our respect for the course and other players motivates us to replace or sand our divot, to rake the trap after we have gouged out our ball. There are lots of other areas of respect, and I don't need to beg the question by mentioning them all.

My encouragement to all of us (myself included) is to love the game ... respect the game ... enjoy the game.

RULES CHAIRMAN

This month I thought it would be fun to have a quiz on a few basic rule infractions just to keep you honest. Also highlights of the new rules of golf (effective 2019) are on the USGA web site (usga.org). I recommend that you spend some time reviewing these rules to get a head start for 2019.

The following 13 questions (bakers dozen) are True or False and the answers can be found on the last page of this newsletter.

1. During a round, a player occasionally makes a practice swing with a swing aid or club with a weighted head cover to check his tempo. Is this permitted in the rules? 2. On the putting green, a player reaches across the hole and taps in a short putt.

The ball is holed and the player incurs a two-stroke penalty in stroke play.

3. A player makes a practice swing near his ball in the fairway and accidentally moves his ball in play with his club. The player has not made a stroke at the ball but does incur a penalty for moving his ball in play and must replace his ball in the original spot from where it was moved from.

4. While a player plays a stroke on the putting green, a fellow-competitor stands on the line behind the player to watch the break, being careful not to disturb the player. Is this permitted in the rules?

5. A player is permitted to touch his line of putt when moving loose impediments by brushing with a towel.

6. A player does not remove his ball marker when he replaces his ball on the putting green; if wind then moves his ball to a new position, he must replace his ball.

7. A player putted his ball from the fringe of the putting green and it struck the unattended flagstick in the hole; in stroke play, there is a two-stroke penalty.

8. A player is not permitted to have the flagstick attended unless the ball is on the putting green.

9. During search, a fellow-competitor moves a player's ball. The fellow-competitor is not penalized. The ball must be replaced.

10. A player's ball in play is accidentally move by his partner. The ball is properly replaced. The player incurs a one-stroke penalty.

11. If a ball in motion after a stroke is deflected by a fellow-competitor's golf bag the ball is played as it lies.

12. A player's tee shot is deflected by a moving maintenance vehicle and goes out of bounds. The player may cancel and replay the stroke without penalty.

13. A player plays a stroke and the ball is deflected by a tree and then strikes his golf bag. The player incurs a one-stroke penalty.

Remember "It is what you think you know is what you don't know".
