RULES CHAIRMAN

LOCAL RULES

The new rules for dropping have some important changes that need to be reviewed. The most important change is the ball when dropped in the drop area can no longer roll up to two club lengths from where the ball hit the ground. The ball must remain in the drop area when it comes to rest. I am providing a three question true or false quiz to help you understand the new rule for dropping.

1. Player A's ball is on a paved cart path. Player A determines the nearest point of complete relief and drops a ball in the correctly measured relief area. The ball lands in the relief area and rolls out of the relief area. Player A plays the ball.

Player A incurs a penalty of one stroke. T or F

2. Player A's ball in on a paved cart path. Player A determines the nearest point of complete relief and measures the relief carefully with his driver.

The first drop lands outside the relief area and comes to rest in the relief area. The second drop lands in the relief area and rolls out of the relief area. Player A places the ball on the spot where the second drop first struck the course and plays the ball.

Player A has proceeded correctly. T or F

3. Player A, in taking lateral relief from a red penalty area, measures the two club-length relief area in the general area with a sand wedge. Player A's first drop lands in the measured relief area and comes to rest about 6 inches outside the measured relief area, not nearer the hole than the reference point. Player A lifts the ball and drops a second time in the measured relief area. The ball remains in the measured relief area. Player A plays the ball

Player A has proceeded correctly. T or F

My Experience Installing Lithium Iron Phosphate (LiFePO₄) Batteries in My Golf Cart

I have successfully installed four (4) 12 volt Lithium Iron Phosphate (LiFePO4) batteries in place of six (6) 8 volt Lead Acid Trojan batteries, in my 2001 Club Car. I thought it might be useful for others considering this modification to the golf cart to be fully aware of the challenges and pitfalls of trying to accomplish a successful installation.

So here are some of the considerations to think about before you proceed with the changeover:

- 1. "DROP IN" IS NOT TRUE Some of the companies advertising the "drop in" Lithium Iron Phosphate (LiFePO4) batteries claim that it's a 30 minute process to changeover your golf cart to these new technology batteries, but proper insulation requires other considerations, and the changeover to different brands of golf carts may require additional consideration and rewiring. Some of the advertising indicates that you can use your old Lead Acid battery charger to charge your new Lithium Iron Phosphate (LiFePO4) batteries, but failure to use the proper charger will shorten the life of your new batteries because the charging protocol for the new batteries is different than that used for the old Lead Acid batteries
- 2. YOUR SUN CITY LIGHT PACKAGE WILL BE AFFECTED Many golf carts using a 48 V system jumper off 16 V across two batteries and that voltage goes to a voltage reducer to produce 12 V for lighting systems. When you change out six 8 V batteries to four 12 V batteries, the voltage regulator has to either be removed from the system or a different type of voltage reducer has to be installed.
- 3. <u>BYPASSING YOUR OBC MAY BE REQUIRED</u> Some golf carts, e.g. Club Cars, have an external charger and a separate computer aboard the golf cart called an "Onboard Computer" (OBC) and this OBC has to be bypassed (or removed from the system) to make the charging system for the Lithium Iron Phosphate (LiFePO4) batteries to charge properly.

4. OLD STATE OF CHARGE METER MAY NOT WORK CORRECTLY - Your state of charge indicator is typically set up for the state of charge for Lead Acid batteries and those charge indicators do not work correctly with Lithium Iron Phosphate (LiFePO4) batteries. Typically, when Lead Acid batteries reach a 50% discharge level, your state of charge indicator on your cart shows zero charge remaining, while the profile for Lithium Iron Phosphate (LiFePO4) batteries is different because the voltage drop across Lithium Iron Phosphate (LiFePO4) batteries is less and the Lithium Iron Phosphate (LiFePO4) batteries actually can be discharged to approximately 20% left before the batteries reach a state of discharge. So you have to have a different state of charge indicator on your cart.

- 5. **BUY THE LARGEST CAPACITY BATTERY YOU CAN AFFORD** While you may have choices among 50 AH, 60 AH or 70 AH. I would most strongly recommend that you buy the batteries that have the largest ampere hour (AH) rating because your cart will probably run much faster (total reduction in weight of over 200 pounds) and the total range of the battery is a function of how fast you drive it. My cart will go more than 24 miles (twice as far) limiting the golf course speed to 12-14 mph instead of running the card at 25 mph. Some golf carts already have this switching function installed on the golf cart.
- 6. THERE MAY BE SEVERAL VENDORS AVAILABLE It appears that most of these batteries are actually made in China, and the quality may vary depending upon where you buy the batteries. While many companies give outrageous warranty claims, there is always an issue whether the company will still be around toward the end of the described warranty. So proceeding with the installation of anything that is new, may have long-term pitfalls. Caveat emptor!
- 7. DEPENDING UPON WHO INSTALLS YOUR BATTERIES, YOU MAY BE SIGNIFICANTLY DAMAGING THE RESALE VALUE OF YOUR GOLF CART Some of the modifications to your golf cart may be irreversible or changing the system back to the original configuration may cost you extra money whenever you decide to sell your golf cart. While the new batteries may increase the value of a golf cart, there is no guarantee that you will be able to recover the cost of installing new technologies.

CONCLUSIONS: I am happy with my installation in my 2001 golf cart after installing the new batteries, reprogramming my onboard Alltrax controller, and looking forward to elimination of watering my batteries every month in the future and being able to charge my golf cart back to full capacity in less than two hours. Even if you have professionals install your Lithium Iron Phosphate (LiFePO4) batteries, you should still be knowledgeable about the required changes and ask tough questions of the selected installer. The installation and operation of these new Lithium Iron Phosphate (LiFePO4) batteries in golf carts is a new frontier for local golf cart companies.

I hope this document helps.

Quiz answers

- 1 False see Rules 14.3b(3) and 14.3c(2) and rule 14.3 penalty statement. Player A gets the general penalty (two strokes) for playing from a wrong place.
- 2. False see Rule 14.3(3) and Rule 14.3 penalty statement. The first drop did not count as one of the two drops prior to placing the ball. When the next rolled out of the relief area, Player A was required to re-drop. When Player A placed the ball after the first drop that counted in the relief procedure, Player A gets the general penalty (two strokes) for a breach of Rule 14.3.
- 3. False see Rule 16.1b and Definition of "Club-Length", Rule 9.4b and penalty statement for Rule 9.4. Player A completed the relief process when the dropped ball came to rest within the relief area defined by the

longest club in his bag other than a putter. Player A then lifted the ball in play and did not replace the ball, incurring the general penalty (two strokes) for playing from a wrong place. Remember the relief area is determined by the longest club in your bag not including the putter.
